### 2018: BY THE NUMBERS





From new After School Programs, expansion of the Teaching Garden, successful Hamper Programs and countless community events, Dovercourt Club has expanded rapidly over the past two years.

The Club experienced numerous external changes like the re-introduction of Tots Daycare program and additional grant support. These changes have allowed staff, interns and community volunteers to deliver programming that continue to embody the principles of belonging, collaboration and opportunity through new, creative mediums. These changes were evident in the launch of 2018's NextGEN Newcomer Youthcomer Program, the continuation of March Break, Winter Break and Summer Camp and community events such as the Spring and Harvest Festival, St. Patrick's Day Parade, Unity Day and Push For Literacy. These events had set the tone for our most ambitious program in late 2018.

We ended 2018 with our biggest annual Christmas Hamper to date. With over 420 food and essential hampers delivered to families, we ambitiously partook in Thanksgiving and Easter Hamper projects in 2019. These new programs and the continuation of traditional events has inspired the Club to embrace new mediums of teaching and learning. Just this year, the improvement of our Technology Learning



Centre, the opening of the Multipurpose Room, installing Smart Board and E-Boards have accelerated our operations. Members now more than ever are being immersed in technology and encouraged to pursue their artistic and academic endeavors.

With the launch of our new Teen Program in 2019, our Club is striving to support and nurture adolescents as they transition into adulthood. These movements would not have been possible without the support from numerous organizations and community individuals who fund, support and provide information to the Club. By creating access to latest technology, providing nutritious meals and delivering enrichening learning programs for over 60 years; we have witnessed the growth of many generations. These years have been exciting and we have enjoyed them as much as our members have as well!







I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Kids Korner staff, students, TCDSB staff and all the childcare families that were involved in making 2018 and 2019 a big success! Here are some highlights from our Preschool Program and St. Anthony's site:

Our Preschool Program, located at 180 Westmoreland Avenue offers care to children ages 2.5 years to 4 years old. Ŏur goal is to continue growing and providing richly rewarding and sustainable programming. Kids Korner, St. Anthony's site, located at 130 Shanly Street within Saint Anthony's Catholic school, provides Before and After Kindergarten Care to children 4 to 5 years old. The School-age Before and After Program provides care to child 6 to 12 years. Both programs were operating at 70% capacity from January 2019 to June 2019. From July onward these 2 programs reduced in size, however both programs remain active and healthy in regards to programming and play engagement experiences.



Throughout the year, all 3 Kids Korner programs ventured out and explored the community. The children took part in regular visits to local libraries, parks, enjoyed gardening time, swimming and various field trips throughout the city. Kids Korner will continue to provide exceptional care and support for our families and growing community. We strive to provide the best service we can, employ experienced and well-trained staff; build opportunities for growth within the organization. Our members are creative thinkers and active contributors dedicated to the growth of children Learning through Play. They demonstrate leadership through supporting all age groups, striving for top quality care using the city of Toronto Assessment tool for Quality Improvement (AQI), Childcare and Early Years Act and the ELECT document. Kids Korner Daycare has had a busy year, filled with fun and adventure, thank you again for being a part of this amazing Organization!





Dovercourt Club's team at Junction Triangle Clubhouse (JTC) carries After School Programs and community events in similar fashion.

Over the past couple of years, JTC members have participated in Character Development, March Break and Summer Camp and Kid Food Nation just to name a few programs. Members have access to different activites from athletics, arts and crafts and drama on a daily basis.

Like it's counter-Club, JTC operates at 1379 Bloor St W. and in local outreach schools. While the Club hosts in-house events and programming, members at outreach school particiate in spontaneous activities as well. With over 200+ members, staff and interns provide a blend of exceptional one-on-one care and group activities. What's different about JTC from other After School clubs? The artistic focus on programming has allowed members to create ambitious crafts.



JTC members' creativity is displayed in their hand-made Yearbooks and holiday festive decorations showcased at St. Luigi Catholic School. JTC has led numerous themed days where members have organized fashion shows, Christmas concerts and Movie evenings.

The success of 2019 Summer Camp has carved the path for expansion for JTC. Spirit of Drumming and Pelham Park Program has attracted more families to this Club and has the braoden the scope of programming. While continuing it's strong focus in artistic expression, like Dovercourt Clubhouse, JTC is moving forward with new technology and modern curriculum that is exciting, inspiring and educational!

#### Kid Food Nation

In partnership with Public Health Agency of Canada, Corus Entertainment and Social Research and Demonstration Corporation - the Kid Food Nation grant and program allowed members aged 7 to 12 years improve their culinary skills, learn about nutrition and cook healthy meals.

#### Basic Needs Brighter Futures

Sponsored by PC Children's Charity, the Basic Needs, Brighter Future grant and program equipped the Club with resources to provide snacks and meals to members through the year. With the objective to feed youth and promote healthy eating habits, this grant has been integral to the Club.

#### Bounce Back League

Supported by the Government of Canada, Bounce Back League equipped members with athletic skills while improving their physical and mental health being. This year, Soccer was the chosen sport at Dovercourt Club.

#### Dunk For Diabetes

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### Partnership Highlights









#### Push For Hope and Push For Literacy

In conjunction with 11 Division and 14 Division Toronto Police Department, fundraising events; The Push For Literacy and Pushing For Hope were organized to raise awareness about struggles faced by youth and create opportunities for literacy and the Club's Character Development programs. During both initiatives; Superintendent Heinz Kuck pushed and pulled a steel sled weighing nearly 400 pounds during a 3km route to Dovercourt Club. So far, over \$20,000 was riased for Character Development programs.

#### Pelham Park Garden

In collaboration with Dovercourt Club, Deputy Mayor Ana Bailao, Ubisoft Games and Toronto Community Housing, After School program; Pelham Park Program was launched in September 2019 at 61 Pelham Park Gardens. This community and education-driven registered program offers youth from ages 6 to 15 years old homework help, STEM and computer programs, arts and crafts and snacks

#### Teaching Garden

The Teaching Garden program has grown vastly since its inception in 2017. Support from The Boulevard Club, Mike and Nicole Tevlin and Patrick and Barbara Keenan Foundation has aided additional programing from the Teaching Garden. From Kid Food Nation to Dovercourt Summer's Teaching Garden programmembers are participating in outdoor and indoor gardening activities all year round.

#### Christmas Hamper Program

Dovercourt Boys and Girls Club for the past 8 years has provided Christmas Hampers for families and individuals in need. Support from numerous organizations including 2018 sponsors, Metro, Mondelez International, The Boulevard Club and Furlani Foods has allowed this program to support Club's members' families with food, clothing and toys for children.

#### After School Programs (MTCS)

The After School Program (ASP) is funded by the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS) and TDSB and TCDSB which runs at Dovercourt Clubhouse and outreach school locations. ASP programs encompass a variety of programs from Swimming, Character Development, Tutoring, Kid Food Nation and Sports Leagues.

#### CIBC Mellon

For the past couple of years, CIBC Mellon volunteers have packed snack packs for the Club's Summer Camp and After School Programs. Over 12,000 snack packs were prepared over the past 5 years.

#### Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation

Established in early 2019, the Multipurpose Room was built to host events, study and complete projects. This versatile space was made possible by City of Toronto and Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation. In addition, the Club's Technology Learning Centre (TLC) is another recent successful project in partnership with and Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation.
