In 2016/17/18 summer jobs for youth ages 15 to 30 under federal government sponsorship will grow from 34,000 to nearly 70,000. Not-for-profit organizations like the Dovercourt Boys and Girls Club are eligible for up to 100 per cent of the minimum wage and mandatory employment related costs.

Also on hand for the announcement was the Minster, The Honourable



MaryAnn Mihychuk directly responsible for Canada Summer Jobs. The Honourable MaryAnn Mihychuk's Employment Workforce and Labour **Department** will oversee the annual budget of up to \$113 million for the Summer Jobs Program. MP for Davenport, Julie Dzerowicz introduced Prime Minister Trudeau. She reminded everyone of the many programs offered at the Club and talked about the positive impact staff and volunteers continue to have on the many boys and girls, ages 4 to 17 years old, it



serves.

The Prime Minister's one-hour visit was filled with a tremendous amount of excitement for Club teen members, including Leaders in Training, also students and teachers

who were on hand from St. Mary's Catholic High School. Accompanying them was School Superintendent, Jim Saraco. In his remarks, Mr. Trudeau indicated: "Youth unemployment has remained stubbornly high, and far too many young people have not been able to

capacity that has been supported for many years by the Canada Summer Jobs Program, over 50 young people are hired for summer work in the Club's Day Camp Programs. In 2015, 14 young men and women were hired for jobs at both the Dovercourt and Junction Triangle Clubhouses.

Prime Minister Trudeau's visit and Canada Summer Jobs announcement received North American wide attention to include coverage in the *Tampa Bay Times* newspaper.

It seems as if it was only yesterday my family and friends joined me in welcoming the New Year. But already the sun as it moves more so in our direction is summoning longer days. This is a signal for the Club also, that Summer Day Camps activities are just around the corner.

However, whatever the time of year, our staff, volunteers and Board of Directors continue the tradition of making sure our members, ages 4

to 17 years old are well served. So many smart goals are incorporated into workable action plans to ensure that the Dovercourt Boys and Girls Club focuses on children and youth's needs. The Club has quite a reach. An important part of its operations is Kids Korner Day Care, where children as early as 2½ years old learn and play in an inclusive environment.

I remember last fall being at the Dovercourt Clubhouse, nearly 200 children occupied what seemed like every available space in the building. Above their voices could be heard staff instructions summoning them to a variety of Afterschool Program activities. As the lines went in deliberate directions, the smiles on so many young faces had me thinking: Where would these children be without the Club?

As the number of members mushroom also at the Junction Triangle Clubhouse location, our realization sometime ago is correct, that the Club's growth is reflective of the demographic and economic transition Toronto is undergoing. This issue and also the current wave of Syrian refugees now settling in our city are some of the dynamics impacting our current Strategic Plan. Later on this year we will again begin the process of evaluating Club impact on community needs and updating the Plan.

Our Club now in its 59th year of operation has always welcomed change for the better. The Dovercourt Boys Club founded in 1957 had a name change in 1976 to the Dovercourt Boys and Girls Club. It has historically remained consistent and focused on its mission: That of ensuring our staff and volunteers with the support of our funders never waiver from helping to prepare boys and girls for their future roles, duties and responsibilities in Canadian society.

Here are the three top things I learned at the Club that have helped me along in my business career;

1. THE VALUE OF TEAMWORK – A company cannot be successful if the employees do not work well as a team. I guess I spent a lot of time in the gym at Dovercourt and on teams. Team work creates a bond among the group that makes everyone try their best to be successful. You win as a team or you lose as a team. I have terrific teams in both the Graphic and Broadcast units at Craft. They are creative, talented and committed to make the company successful. They make my job easier.

2. HONESTY AND RESPECT – I learned to treat everyone with honesty and respect, especially your leaders. If you are fair and honest with staff and clients, you will earn that respect back. It is important that you lead by example, and others will follow the same path.

3. THE IMPORTANCE OF NETWORKING - At some time in our lives, we lose touch with people. Everyone moves on in different directions for a variety of reasons. Don't let that happen.
